But forasmuche as the most of these thins ges are bery true and manifelt, some pertayning onely to the office of a midwyfe, other for the reverence of the matter, not mete to be disclosed to every vile person: 3 entende in this booke to lette them all palle, and to treate only of the thynges nes

the tender babes are oftentimes affected, and defolate of remedy, forfomuch as many doe suppose that there is no cure to bee ministred buto them, by reason of they? weakenes. And by that baine opinion, yea rather by a folithe feare, they forlake mas ny that might be wel recovered, as it shal appeare by the grace of God hereafter, in this litle treatise, whe we come to p declaracion of the medicines . In the meane feason for confiinitie of the matter, 3 ens tende to writ somwhat of the nource, & of the milk, with the qualities, and compler. ions of the same, for in that consideth the chief pount and fum, not only of the main. tenaunce of helth, but also of the four ming of infecting either of the witte oz maners, as the Poet Wirgil when he woulde dife cribe an bucurteis churliche, and a rude condishioned Tyzaunt, did attribute the faulte buto the gener of the milke, as in laying thus.
